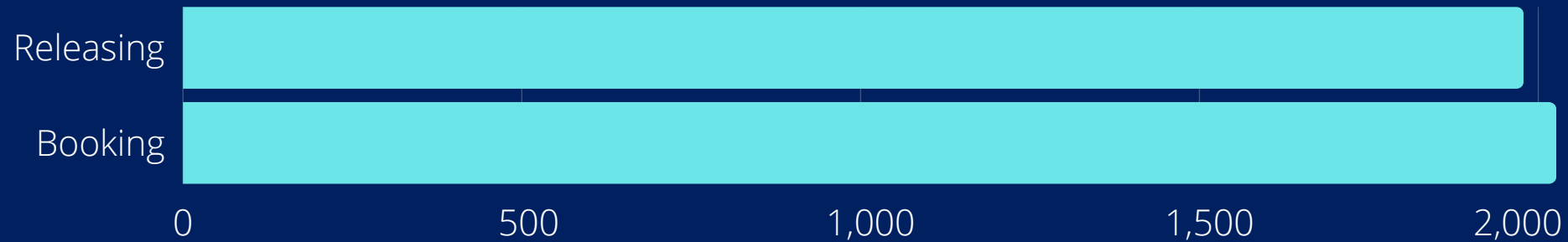

EMPLOYEE UPDATE

- 14 Cadets graduated the academy on May 14
- 17 new cadets started academy on May 30
- 305 total employees

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT

- Significant reduction in triple celling -- From 250 cells in November 2021 to 15 cells in May 2022
- Repaired fire system -- The November report noted the main fire system was yellow tagged. By the time of the May report, the system was green tagged and fully operational.
 - This is the first time the system has been green tagged in many years.
- No showers without hot water -- Reduced from 5 in November 2021 to 0 in May 2022



HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT

- Fewer showers with drain problems -- Reduced from 9 in November 2021 to 2 in May 2022
- No missed medical rounds or wound care -- The November 2021 report noted several missed, but the May 2022 report had none
- No failure to notify Health Dept. of serious injury or suicide -- Reduced from 2 instances in November 2021 to 0 in May 2022

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT

Items related to facility design/construction:

- Windows on cell doors are small and can easily be obscured, which reduces visibility
- Walls are made of cinder blocks which can be penetrated to create holes in the walls between cells
- Ceiling tiles are easily damaged or removed



HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT

Items related to facility design/construction:

- Light fixtures which have been damaged because they are exposed inside the cells
- Inadequate lighting is associated with little to no natural light in the facility
- Overcrowding and triple-celling issues, many of which are caused by the need to move detainees to another cell to make repairs inside the cells for issues listed above.



FUTURE PROJECTS

- CONTINUED CONTRABAND EFFORTS
 - Body Scanner: 4 out of every 10 detainees attempting to hide contraband each day
 - Continued random employee and contractor searches
 - Intel is one of the key tools to discover contraband
- WORKING WITH LEXIPOL ON JAIL POLICY UPDATES
- SHARING INFORMATION WITH COMMUNITY ADVISORY BOARD
